

Future looking bright for city centre

Excitement builds as Friars Walk opening nears

A host of big names have revealed plans to return to Newport city centre or open stores there for the first time.

Friars Walk is rapidly filling up, with many of those who have signed up due to start trading on 12 November when the multi-million leisure and retail scheme officially opens.

Others will open in the following weeks ensuring this will be a Christmas to remember for the city centre.

It was reported in the summer that Marks and Spencer were planning to make a comeback with a new food hall; toy and game shop The Entertainer has unveiled plans to open a new store in Austin Friars; and Sports Direct has started trading in Commercial Street.

In recent weeks, it has been announced that JD Sports, Krispy Kreme, Occasions Cards, Pandora and the Candle Company have all been confirmed for Friars Walk. A bowling alley is also planned for the near future.

Councillor Bob Bright, Leader of Newport City Council, said: "It is great to

see a mixture of independents and big names now flocking to take space in Friars Walk. This is more good news for Newport and the city centre and the excitement as we get closer to the opening day in November is tangible.

"Like many Newport residents, I will also be delighted to welcome Marks and Spencer back to the city centre. I'm glad that their absence from the city centre, after the lease in their previous premises expired, has proved to be only temporary. This is another

sign of the high level of confidence in Friars Walk and the city centre."

In July, Friars Walk was named as one of Britain's top council-led regeneration schemes by the British Council of Shopping Centres (BCSC).

Councillor Bright added: "Newport is undergoing a renaissance and is on the rise to become a dynamic, 21st century city where people will want to live, work and visit."

Councillor John Richards, Newport City Council's Cabinet Member for

Regeneration and Investment, said:

"Friars Walk is playing a key role in the revitalisation of the city centre but is part of a wider regeneration vision including the Vibrant and Viable Places programme, which is helping to transform key buildings into new homes, businesses and spaces."

Friars Walk will offer more than 390,000 sq ft of modern retail and leisure space. It will include a full-range Debenhams department store, 35 retail units including Next, H&M, Topshop,

River Island and New Look, an eight screen Cineworld multiplex cinema, 11 restaurants, 350 parking spaces and a major new bus station interchange.

On completion, the scheme will provide an estimated 1,200 jobs in addition to the jobs created during the construction phase and the potential for local companies to be involved in the supply chain of the centre.

Public space protection order – your city centre – you decide what takes place

How many times have you felt frustrated that important decisions affecting your community or the quality of your life are taken by other people? Well here's the chance to do something about it.

New legislation in the form of a public space protection order allows local authorities to prohibit any persistent behaviour in a public place that impacts negatively upon the quality of life of those who live in, work in or visit that area.

The new law replaces the current city centre alcohol designation order which makes it illegal to consume alcohol on the streets of the city centre away from licensed premises – effectively an alcohol exclusion zone.

Newport City Council is consulting the public on what they would like to see

included in the new legislation aimed at improving people's city centre experience by tackling behaviour that undermines it.

The powers of a public space protection order are more wide-reaching and have the potential to tackle a number of issues that cause a nuisance to the public in the city centre and impinge upon the quality of their lives.

The new public space protection order has the scope and the potential to deliver something very positive for the city. The council, however, is mindful of the importance of striking the right balance between protecting the public and respecting civil liberties and freedom of expression and movement.

Newport City Council's Cabinet Member for Regulatory Functions, Councillor Bob Poole, said:

"Few people in Newport will have failed to notice the changes taking place in the heart of the city centre, most notably Friar's Walk retail development due to open in November and arguably the most significant investment in Newport's recent history. The regeneration of the city centre is complemented by the restoration of some of its finest buildings under the Welsh Government's Vibrant and Visible Places Programme."

He added: "It is perhaps timely against this background of positive change that this new piece of legislation offers the city and its residents the chance to build on that momentum by ensuring that the experience of people visiting the city centre is a positive one."

Finding housing solutions in Newport

Recent changes in how the council helps people who are homeless or at risk of being made homeless have been introduced by the Welsh Government under the Housing (Wales) Act 2014.

The council has a legal duty to offer help and assistance to individuals in these circumstances, and has with services aimed at helping to prevent homelessness from occurring or to find an alternative solution.

Under the changes, the council has been working with a number of private landlords in Newport to

identify suitable accommodation for individuals through financial help and practical support to both the landlord were already been helped into private rented housing between April and July 2015.

The council is keen to expand the work as it has proved successful, and would like to hear from landlords looking to rent out accommodation.

The Friars Walk story

November 12 2015 will see the opening of the eagerly awaited Friars Walk retail and leisure development in the heart of Newport city centre.

Ten years of hard work will come to fruition when doors open at 10am and new shops such as Debenhams open for the first time in the city.

While there has been work behind the scenes for over a decade, construction of the 390,000 sq. ft space has taken less than two years from the demolition of Capitol car park on a cold January morning in 2014 to its opening in the autumn of 2015.

In April 2005, Newport City Council first announced

plans for a multi-million pound redevelopment of the city centre, but the developer went into administration. The council was keen to ensure that the dream of a redeveloped city centre was not lost and bought the land needed for the development to take place before the compulsory purchase orders expired. This meant the site was ready for development when the global economic recovery started and work could begin quickly.

At the end of 2013, the council took the bold move to acquire funding for the scheme, and now, in less than two months, we will see the fruition of the decisions the council took – which at times were not popular with some people.

The British Council of Shopping Centres has praised Newport City Council for the bold steps it has taken in leading this regeneration and described the council as being “on the front foot” to ensure the redevelopment happened.

Friars Walk will have space for 36 retail stores including Debenhams, Next, Marks and Spencer, H&M and River Island, 11 restaurants and an eight screen cinema.

It is anticipated that it will see Newport rise from number 198 for shopping destinations in the UK to being in the top 100, and 1,200 jobs will be created bringing around £15 million of salaries into the local economy.

I think people don’t appreciate what is on their doorstep.

Newport first to adopt new planning initiative

Newport City Council has become the first in Wales to introduce a planning initiative which will reduce the red tape for certain types of development in the city centre.

A Local Development Order (LDO) is now in force following a public consultation earlier this year and the approval of the Welsh Government.

It streamlines the planning system by granting blanket planning permission for non-contentious forms of development in a defined area.

A range of specified uses are allowed on the lower, ground and upper floors of buildings. In order to protect the retail and café functions of the city centre, the LDO is more restrictive and permits only certain changes of use in the ground-floor units of these areas.

Councillor John Richards, Newport City Council’s Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Investment, said: “We believe this will have considerable benefits for the city centre by increasing occupancy levels and commercial activity.

“We are working hard to support and stimulate appropriate development to help boost the city centre’s vibrancy while protecting its character and traditional architecture. I am grateful to all those who took part in the consultation which helped shape the final scheme.

All systems go for new Welsh-medium secondary school

Newport's new Welsh-medium secondary school is one step closer after Newport City Council's cabinet – acting as a local determination panel – took the decision to establish the school.

The new school will open next September and will become the city's ninth secondary school. Work is currently happening on the site it will share with Duffryn High School to build the new school which will provide Welsh-medium education for secondary school aged children.

Cabinet Member for Education and Young People, Councillor Debbie Wilcox, said: "Mae hwn yn ddiwrnod hanesyddol I addysg yng

Nghasnewydd.

"The decision by Cabinet to proceed with establishing a Welsh-medium secondary school was a historic day. For parents who choose for their child to be educated through the medium of Welsh it means they can have all their education in Newport, from nursery through to secondary school. This decision will provide the best education for our children in Newport and south Monmouthshire."

Funding of the new school is via the 21st century school programme as a joint enterprise through Welsh Government, Newport City Council and Monmouthshire County Council.

The development of regional Welsh-medium secondary education

provision in Newport will deliver up to 900 school places in future years and meet the demand that exists across the region. The new school will open in September 2016 for year 7 pupils.

Following the decision by Newport City Council's Cabinet, the chief education officer will work with the Education Achievement Service head of governor support to set up a temporary governing body immediately. They will take forward matters such as the recruitment of the head teacher, the school staffing structure and organisation of the new school including site access, time of the school day, uniform, name and transition arrangements.

Cymraeg rhanbarthol yng Nghasnewydd yn darparu hyd at 900 o leodd ysgol yn y dyfodol ac ateb y galw sy'n bodoli ar draws y rhanbarth. Bydd yr ysgol newydd yn agor ym Medi 2016 ar gyfer disgyblion blwyddyn 7.

Yn dilyn y penderfyniad gan Gabinet Cyngor Dinas Casnewydd i sefydlu'r ysgol, bydd y prif swyddog addysg yn gweithio gyda phennaeth cefnogi llywodraethwyr y Gwasanaeth Cyflawni Addysg i sefydlu corff llywodraethu dros dro ar unwaith. Exam success for Newport pupils at A level & GCSE

There was A Level and GCSE success for Newport pupils in the recent exam results

Schools in the city maintained their high performance in the WJEC A Level examinations with results above the Wales average for pupils gaining grades A* - C.

The percentage of those gaining an A* was 5.9 per cent while the percentage of those gaining an A*-A was 23.2 per cent, above the Wales average of 23.1 per cent.

The percentage of those gaining an A* - C was 76.3 per cent, an increase of 0.8 percentage points from last year, and above the Wales average of 74.3 per cent.

The proportion of students achieving a pass grade at WJEC A Level

(Grades A* - E) was 97.1 per cent, in line with the Wales average of 97.3 per cent.

There was a rise in Newport WJEC exam entries of 8.6 per cent from last year, a higher increase in entries than the Wales rise of 1.5 per cent.

The number of pupils in Newport achieving WJEC GCSE A* - A grades was 18.7 per cent.

Figures for the WJEC examinations show that 60.4 per cent of entries in Newport achieved grades A* - C. Overall, 97.9 per cent of WJEC entries in the city were graded between A* - G.

The proportion of Newport pupils achieving a pass at WJEC GCSE is slightly higher than the Wales average for all exam boards.

New scheme for landlords and agents

New housing legislation which comes into effect in the autumn will place a duty on private landlords or their agents to obtain a licence to operate.

The Rent Smart Wales scheme will be administered by a new single licensing authority at Cardiff Council. It will replace the Landlord Accreditation Wales scheme (LAW).

Landlords renting out accommodation will be required by law to register with Rent Smart Wales – a process that can be completed online. Those employing an agent to rent

a property on their behalf will have a responsibility to ensure that they are licensed to do so.

At 11am on Thursday 1

October, the Welsh Guards will begin to parade from the top of Cambrian Road (outside Wetherspoons) to Bridge Street and then through High Street to the D-Day Memorial.

A short ceremony will take place before the parade again moves off through High Street and along Commercial Street to its junction with Charles Street.

On the evening of 30 September, a special rugby match will take place between Newport RFC and the Welsh Guards at 19:15 at Rodney Parade.

Communities First Newport North steps up to the Change for Life challenge

Communities First team in Newport North, received two boxes of pedometers from Change for Life to encourage local people to sign up to a challenge that would help them to get active over the summer.

The team promoted the challenge at different events and had over one hundred people from the local area sign-up to take part. They each received a Change for Life drawstring bag, a water bottle and a pedometer.

Contact details were collected for everyone involved so that they could receive regular texts and send their step counts back. Those who have replied had their steps entered onto a spreadsheet so that their progress could be monitored over the summer.

To encourage people to keep in touch about their step count, prizes have been given out on a fortnightly basis to the individuals who sent a text and completed the most steps for that time period; these included family swim vouchers, flowers and footballs.

The challenge has been very successful; one participant said that, "I've

started taking the dog out far more often to get my steps up!"

Another participant commented that "it's a great opportunity to get active with my children and the pedometers make it like a competition!"

The challenge will run for another few weeks and so far, most people have increased their step count over time.

Painting a brighter life for people with dementia

Staff at two Newport care homes are to work with an innovative project to help stimulate the residents through music, dance and other arts.

Age Cymru's cARTrefu Arts in Care Homes will be hold sessions in Spring Gardens in Belle Vue Terrace and Parklands in Malpas over the next couple of months.

Staff will be trained so they can continue the work with residents and help them express themselves through different art media and have fun at the same time.

Spring Gardens is currently working towards achieving the Dementia Care Matters' Butterfly kite mark award recognising a good level of care for people with dementia.

A recent report found Spring Gardens was well on its way to achieving the

standard and commented that "it felt like a home with a heart".

Newport City Council and its partners are currently working towards accreditation from the Alzheimer's Society as a dementia friendly city.

Last month Mayor Councillor Herbie Thomas and Councillor Paul Cockeram, Cabinet Member for Adult and Community Services, officially opened the intermediate care unit at Parklands. A Welsh Government grant was used to fund the conversion of a number of rooms at Parklands Residential Home in Malpas to assist older people regain their confidence and independence following a stay in hospital or help prevent admission to hospital.

Help your city meet its recycling targets

Newport City Council, like all local authorities in Wales, is facing extremely challenging recycling targets that are set by the Welsh Government. For this financial year, Newport has to hit a 58 per cent recycling target but this will continue to increase to 70 per cent by 2025.

The council offers a very comprehensive recycling service and we would encourage all residents to participate in recycling at home as greater resident participation is needed if we are to meet these targets and avoid a significant fine from the Welsh Government.

The council also faces fines if it exceeds the amount it sends to landfill and faces a fine of £400 per tonne, which could be as high as £800,000 in a single year if the target isn't met.

Newport City Council is one of five local authorities that is a member of Project

Green – a partnership between Caerphilly, Cardiff, Monmouthshire, Newport and the Vale of Glamorgan. The municipal waste of these five authorities makes up 40 per cent of the total municipal waste of Wales.

Project Green looks for the best environmental, cost effective and practical solution for waste after recycling and composting has been maximised in each area. An energy from waste plant will open at Trident Park in

Cardiff early next year and will turn the five councils' non-recyclable waste into enough energy to power 50,000 homes a year rather than this waste being sent to landfill.

For the eighth year in a row, Newport's Belle Vue Park has been awarded a prestigious Green Flag in recognition of the high standards maintained at the park throughout the year.

Newport City Council's Cabinet Member for Streetscene and City Services, Councillor Deb Davies, has welcomed this news: "To receive a Green Flag for the eighth year in a row is fantastic news and a real testament to the hard work and dedication of all

the council's park staff.

"I would also like to thank the volunteers of Newport's ornamental parks who contribute their time, effort and energy to ensure Newport's parks are perfect places for relaxation and recreation for visitors.

"Belle Vue Park is a stunning parkland boasting fantastic views over Newport and is home to some rare trees and shrubs."

A Green Flag award recognises and rewards the best parks and green spaces in Wales and is awarded by Keep Wales Tidy.

Run by Newport City Council, the historic Belle Vue Park has now received the honour for eight years in succession.

Lord Tredegar donated land in 1891 for the purpose of a public park for the people of Newport.

There are a number of rare specimens at the park including Himalayan Magnolias and Judas trees. There is also the tulip tree which produces distinctive orange tulip-shaped flowers in June and July. In autumn the spectacular changing colour of the leaves is not to be missed.

Site of derelict pubs to be transformed

Two former pubs have been demolished to create new homes for people in the Pillgwenlly area of Newport.

One, the historic Kings Arms in Commercial Road, had become an eyesore and was the source of significant anti-social behaviour. Now work on the site of the Kings Arms and an adjacent pub by Seren will mark the latest of a raft of major developments in the city centre.

Landmark buildings are being given a new lease of life thanks to the Welsh Government's Vibrant and Viable Places programme which is being delivered by Newport City Council in partnership with private

and third sector organisations such as Seren.

Neil Barber, Seren director of development, explained the pubs would be replaced by a modern building, sympathetic to the site's heritage, that will house nine apartments with undercroft parking plus a large four-bedroom house.

Councillor John Richards, Newport City Council's cabinet member for regeneration, Investment and housing, said: "I welcome the Seren Group's scheme which not only rids Pill of a derelict building which was causing a real nuisance in the community, but will create quality new homes that meet a need in that area.

"It is sad that the King's

Arms was left to decay but I'm sure residents will be glad to see it being replaced with homes fit for the 21st century."

Work commenced in early June by local contractor Willis Construction, and the new

homes should be ready for residents to move in during summer 2016.

Newport City Council was awarded £15 million of VVP regeneration funding which forms part of the overall £250m investment now taking place in the city

centre.

Other projects underway as part of the programme include creating flats offices and retail units in the form of Kings Hotel in High Street and the restoration of the National Buildings in Commercial Street.

Regeneration project leaves a lasting legacy

The Pillgwenlly Regeneration Project in Newport has come to an end but leaves behind transformed buildings, improved public areas and some spectacular art work.

Over the last four years, around £6 million has been spent in the area thanks to a programme led by Newport City Council with financial backing from the Welsh Government's European Regional Development Fund and the Targeted Match Fund.

It has successfully achieved its objective to deliver regeneration in Pill through environmental improvements, a business grants scheme and the creation of a community resource centre.

Councillor John Richards, Newport City Council's Cabinet Member for Regeneration, Investment and Housing, said: "Even though this regeneration project has come to an end, we are continuing to find ways to help enhance the area and its environment for those who live and work in Pill."

An additional £5,000 was also awarded to support a Chartist legacy project involving training young people in film production

The council has also

worked with partners to access more than £320,000 for collaborative projects supporting different sectors of tourism. The funding has come from the Welsh Government via Visit Wales as part of the regional tourism engagement fund.

Councillor John Richards, Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Investment, said: "I believe very passionately that tourism is an important growth sector for Newport. It is vital for a mixed economy."

Views from the Chair of Newport's Fairness Commission

What is Fairness?

It's no accident that in times of economic austerity, politicians and policy-makers are keen to demonstrate that their policies, despite reductions in spending, are still adhering to principles of fairness. "We can't do anything about the cuts, but at least we can use resources fairly" is the plea, no doubt, that will be made.

However, we must recognise that fairness is a 'hurrah' word which everyone cheers about – nobody, after all, says they want an unfair society, but with the cheers for fairness masking how the word carries with it many conflicting meanings. So, people will often say that fairness is about treating everyone the same, but this principle clashes with the idea that we also should take account of people's differences. For example, children with special educational needs might

warrant being treated differently, with this difference in treatment being also thought of as fair!

Newport City's Fairness Commission (set-up by Council in 2012 and being the first of its kind in Wales) sees one of its main jobs, as encouraging debate about these issues on fairness. Its activities have included, producing a detailed report in November 2013 on fairness, including a public survey of Newport citizens' views; submitting annual assessments of council budget proposals; delivering training programmes on 'thinking critically' about fairness; setting-up a twitter account to encourage public discussions about fairness.
